

Is this cat owned?

Found a "lost" cat?

Around 35% of owners allow their cats to free roam, sometimes without visible identification like a collar or nametag. It's very common for a cat owner to allow their cat to be outside or to be caretaker to a free-roaming "community cat" without an identifiable owner.

Cats may act starved or so friendly that you assume they must be lost, but most often, this is not the case! Cats are great con artists who love to eat at as many homes as possible! Ask your neighbors if they know the cat, post on Facebook & Nextdoor, have the cat scanned for a chip, and post signs in your community!

If a small corner of the cat's left ear is been surgically removed, that's called an "ear tip". This is a universal sign of a community cat that has already been spayed or neutered and should not be disturbed unless they are sick or injured.

Paper Collar Directions

1. Print this template & provide any contact information you wish to share.
2. Use a small piece of tape to connect only the ends.
3. Don't cover the collar in tape. The collar needs to be able to break off for safety if the cat gets caught.
4. Make sure there's space for at least 2 fingers beneath the collar.
5. Repeat if needed.
